Learning from Electoral Setbacks

Maharashtra

Showed that a coalition focused on internal negotiations rather than grassroots engagement cannot withstand the BJP's onslaught of money, muscle, and machinery.

Haryana

Demonstrated that mass discontent alone is insufficient; it must be converted into political momentum through sustained engagement.

Delhi

Revealed how arithmetic without chemistry fails and how voters punished the AAP government's theatrics and gimmicks.

Recent electoral losses provide a sobering reality check for the INDIA bloc. In each case, the alliance failed its supporters by taking them for granted and abandoning the listening model that had previously resonated with voters.

These defeats highlight the consequences of reverting to old political habits instead of maintaining the grassroots engagement that characterized the successful yatras.





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


Evidence-Based Policy


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Listen First

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Combating Voter Disillusionment


