



Wilful Violation: Tamil Nadu Governor's Conduct

The Supreme Court of India has raised probing questions about Tamil Nadu Governor R.N. Ravi's conduct, exposing a pattern of wilful violation of constitutional duty. The Court's inquiries focus on the lawfulness of Ravi's decision to refer Bills to the President of India after previously withholding assent, despite being constitutionally obligated to grant assent upon their second adoption by the State Assembly.





Constitutional Obligations and Governor's Actions



Governor Ravi initially withheld assent on several Bills passed by the Tamil Nadu State Assembly.

Referral to President

Instead of granting assent, Governor Ravi referred the Bills to the President of India, raising questions about the legality of this action.

Second Adoption

The State Assembly adopted the Bills for a second time, triggering the constitutional requirement for the Governor to grant assent.





Supreme Court's Probing Questions

1 Motive Behind Referral

The Court asked whether the Governor referred the Bills to the President solely to avoid granting assent as required by Article 200 of the Constitution.

2 Constitutional Interpretation

judgment clarified that Governors should return Bills to the legislature when withholding assent, and must grant assent if passed again.

3 Governor's Responsibility

The Court questioned the Governor's understanding and adherence to his constitutional duties in handling state legislation.

Attorney-General's Arguments

Repugnancy Issue

The A-G argued that the Governor rightly referred the Bills to the President due to potential conflicts with UGC Regulations, particularly regarding the appointment of university vice-chancellors.

Bill Status

It was contended that
when the Governor
withheld assent, the Bills
ceased to exist, and the
Assembly presumed they
had been "returned"
before adopting them a
second time.

Return Requirement

The A-G argued that the requirement to return a Bill does not apply if repugnancy with central law is noted.







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
Governor's Pattern of Obstruction

Delayed Action

The Governor did not act on some Bills for one to two years, raising questions about his intentions.

Selective Obstruction

The Governor appears to be scuttling laws that do not align with his personal views.



Ignored Constitutional Duty

Ravi disregarded his obligation to grant assent when Bills were presented a second time.

Questionable Referrals

The Court previously
questioned whether a
Governor could refer a Bill to
the President after
withholding assent.
